December is Universal Human Rights Month

Every December, we acknowledge the [Universal Declaration of Human Rights](#), an international document adopted by the United Nations on December 10, 1948 as the foundation of human rights law and “a road map to guarantee the rights of every individual everywhere.” Published in more than 500 languages, it is one of the most translated documents in the world.

Eleanor Roosevelt chaired the international committee charged with drafting the Declaration and is recognized as the driving force behind its adoption. Joining her on the committee were representatives from China, Canada, France, USSR, Chile, United Kingdom, Lebanon and Australia.

The first Article of the Declaration states:

“All human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights.”

At a time when our country and our world seem to be at odds over everything, let us seize this opportunity during Human Rights Month to learn about other cultures. When we begin to see things from another perspective, we are better able to understand and accept differences among us. ■

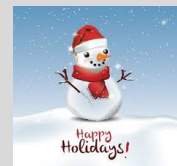

Within most societies, participation is reserved for only a few. To increase access, society must remove barriers to participation. For equity, historically-undermined groups should be encouraged to speak." ■

Webinar Explores Urban Teacher Residency Program

MSU's Urban Teacher Residency is an apprenticeship-based program for individuals dedicated to teaching in urban areas. The UTR program provides on-site education, intensive class-room experiences with a master teacher, mentoring, and professional development.

A generous living stipend helps cover the cost of graduate tuition while enrolled in the 12-month program. Graduates earn their NJ teacher certification and a Master of Arts in Teaching, and must make a three-year commitment to teach in the Newark or Orange Public School District.

- Family Services interns are currently serving and making an impact in 15 different social service agencies and non-profits, throughout surrounding communities including Paterson, East Orange, Montclair, and Passaic.
- Our Social Justice Advisory Board continued the important work of creating spaces for all voices to be heard through town halls and open forums, and ensuring that social justice is at the forefront of all that we do, including training opportunities, curriculum development, and community engagement.
- Our department faculty and staff met in person in October for a retreat -- our first time gathering together since February 2020! We discussed our vision for the department and came up with many short- and long-term goals. It was great to be in the same room as my colleagues who care so deeply about the department and we look forward to continue working as a team to meet these goals.
- We were honored to co-sponsor MSU's Native Land Acknowledgement event during Native American Heritage month, which publicly acknowledged that MSU occupies the traditional territory of the Lenni-Lenape people.
- Our FSHD-based student group, the Montclair Student Council on Family Relations, has been actively serving the community by successfully organizing service projects to fulfill identified needs, including a PB&J drive for Livingston Neighbors Helping Neighbors in honor of Eid, and a Halloween costume drive to benefit children and families through Jersey Cares. This month, MSCFR is collaborating with the wonderful students in Dr. Olena Nesteruk's Immigrant Families course to collect winter accessories and gift cards for Syrian and Afghan refugee families and kids who are resettling to new lives in NJ. The nonprofit who helps these families is Welcome Home Jersey City. This donation drive runs through December 9 (find the flyer on page 4!).
- Chris Cottle, our Undergraduate Advisor, earned the inaugural College of Education and Human Services' Employee Recognition Award for his commitment to building a collegial community and his work in helping to "lift black voices and make MSU a more inclusive environment for students of color."
- We have two undergraduate student workers (Sean and Nas) who have been awesome in helping us with our day-to-day operations as well as social media promotion.
- Last but not least, in addition to being dedicated educators, our faculty are also prolific scholars in a variety of fields of study. In the past few months, they have been
